### Big Lottery awards Bradley Stoke £55,000 for a Beacon Park

The description of Beacon Parks Projects to the Lottery was that the Beacon Playground serves two purposes.

- to serve the play needs of the children who live nearby providing them with high quality and varied play environments
- to provide a practical demonstration to show what alternative approaches to playful landscape design can be achieved within certain limited budget and in keeping with criteria, principles and values set out in our play policy. Sites were chosen to represent a cross section of geographical, economic and social factors.

The site earmarked in Bradley Stoke is the Jubilee Green in Savages Wood Road and the project description for the application to the Lottery showed that this site would demonstrate what could be done for a £55,000 budget as the site is surrounded by large areas of housing development which provides open space but is little equipped or designed for play opportunities. The high child population in the area and the large open space made this the sensible choice for the largest of the Beacon Playgrounds. The target for this site is to provide access to a rich, varied and interesting dedicated play area for regular new use by up to 500 children.

The project will officially start from 1 April 2008 with the aim of completing by 30 March 2009, but preparation, planning and consultation work is likely to start ahead of this date.

# The Senior Citizens' Forum

The Senior Citizens' Forum comprises over 3300 men and women over the age of 50 in South Gloucestershire who take an active interest in the way society treats its senior citizens.

The Forum is not a political body and is not affiliated to any political party but it takes an active interest in matters that concern senior citizens, such as the State Pension, crime prevention, health care and transport. A Newsletter is published four times each year and bi-monthly meetings are held in locations around South Gloucestershire, usually between 2 - 4pm. One of these meetings could be an opportunity to question the leaders of the three main political parties on South Gloucestershire Council about matters of general concern. Very popular senior citizens information days are held in two or three different locations for members and run from 10am – 4pm. They involve at least two presentations from experts and include free lunch and refreshments. South Gloucestershire Council gives grant aid to the Forum as do many Parish and Town Councils, including Bradley Stoke.

# The Nicola Corry Support Foundation

The Nicola Corry Support Foundation is one of the Mayor's chosen charities for the current year. Achieving registered charity status on June 2006, the foundation began as a support fund for Nicola to help in her fight against cancer.

Friends set up the fund initially in 2004 by organizing a promise auction raising £5000 to help Nicola fund complementary therapies and childcare costs for her son Alfie. Nicola sadly lost her battle in May 2005 but since then family and friends have continued with the fund to help others in a similar situation. Nicola's ordeal really highlighted the severe lack of resources for people with young families living with cancer and so the NCSF aims to:

- Assist families with childcare costs. This is particularly important if a parent needs to regularly visit hospital for a treatment;
- Donate grants to families to help them afford a treat together;
- Fund improvements to NHS cancer facilities for families with young children;
- Donate to research into rare cancers.

# CustomerFirst - Giving consumers the choice:

Businesses in South Gloucestershire can sign up to a new scheme that recognises and encourages them to provide high levels of customer care.

South Gloucestershire Council's Trading Standards Service has launched CustomerFirst, which recognises businesses that are committed to providing excellent customer service and to trade in a fair, honest and legal way.

Other aims of the scheme include:

- giving consumers a reliable way of finding trustworthy businesses and allow them to make more informed choices
- offering a source of help and advice if things go wrong
- enabling local businesses to demonstrate that they have signed up to national standards

CustomerFirst has been nationally recognised by the Office of Fair Trading, and as a result has been able to join the Local Authority Assured Trader Scheme Network, which provide national, consistent standards for schemes of this type.

The scheme is open to any business that deals with consumers. Those that apply to join will be assessed by Trading Standards officers, to ensure they conduct themselves in a legal, fair and honest way and provide good customer care. If an application is successful, then the business is expected to abide by CustomerFirst's code of practice.

# A new town centre for Bradley Stoke

A new town centre for Bradley Stoke is at last becoming a reality after many years of waiting. Building work on the site, adjacent to the existing Tesco superstore, began on 10 December and will last for about 18 months.

Commenting on the progress, Felix Gummer, Tesco's Corporate Affairs Manager, said: "For the residents of Bradley Stoke the town centre has been a long time coming but at last we can say we have started building it! It has taken us several years of detailed negotiations to ensure we get the right development but what is planned will be a credit to the town.

"We now have to find a new name for the centre and will be launching a competition to find that name in association with the Town Council."

Contractors, Bowmer & Kirkland, have already started clearing the site of top soil following extensive archaeological and wildlife surveys required as part of the development's pre-start conditions.

Permanent site cabins were delivered on 10 December and located behind the Three Brooks Public House. The existing site compound was then closed and given over to the archaeologists to complete their studies before the new road is built. The contractors are undertaking a full perimeter survey with a view to erecting all new fences before the main works start.

The town centre will feature a new Tesco Extra store with a further five large non-food retail units, about 15 smaller individual retail units, cafes, bars, bistros and offices all located around a town square. The centre will have car parking for about 1,200 cars and a new bus station with taxi rank.

The new Tesco store should be open before Christmas 2008 when the existing store will close and transfer its operations overnight. The remaining retail units will be ready at about the same time with the development fully open in 2009.

## Town Councillors are not paid!

A question raised at a Town Council meeting just before Christmas asked what remuneration and expenses were received by Town Councillors. The completely truthful answer is that they receive none at all. There is no salary or honorarium for being a Town Councillor and expenses (if claimed – and they usually are not) only apply if the councillor is making an official call beyond the parish boundaries. There are fifteen Town Councillors serving seven town wards and any payments made to them would increase the annual Precept accordingly.

Local Council elections in South Gloucestershire are held every four years for all seats although sometimes a by-election may be called to fill a seat vacated by a Councillor for whatever reason. The next election when all local council seats will again become vacant will be in 2011.

However, any person who is elected to serve on South Gloucestershire Council is entitled to a range of payments and expenses depending on position(s) held. Anyone interested in further information should contact South Gloucestershire Council.

The election of Members of Parliament works to a quite different schedule, where the Prime Minister of the day calls a General Election at a time of his or her own choosing. By-elections may also occur when necessary to replace an MP.



# Baileys Court Activity Centre

Baileys Court Activity Centre has now been greatly extended and all the rooms are available for hire. Two rooms have been added which may be used independently of each other or linked together to form one larger room. A third self-contained 'suite' has been created to accommodate the youth clubs that used to meet in The Green Hut, which has been demolished.

The original pavilion remains largely unaltered except for a coat of paint that was applied as part of a rehabilitation scheme for occupants of Leyhill Prison. CCTV has been upgraded and extended and the car park lighting has been considerably improved. New safety netting has been included alongside the car park to prevent all but the most spectacular of the cricketers' sixes from slamming into the car park and adjacent play area. New storage has been provided for cricket field and bowling green equipment as well as improved exits from the bowling green under health and safety regulations.

The frontage onto Baileys Court Road at last gives a worthy 'presence' to the building instead of the original dingy little entrance that was quite hidden away behind a rather unkempt shrubbery and a dilapidated green shed. The old entrance door – suitably painted – now forms a smart internal access between sections of the new building. It is difficult to imagine it as it used to be, such is the transformation.

All in all, the planning, preparation and realization of the project has taken several years. The Cavanna Partnership, who designed the building, and Pearce's, the contractors, have given us a splendid new facility on time and within budget and have been a joy to work with for all this time and especially over the seven months of the actual building. Council would also like to thank the hirers for their co-operation during this period and hope they are as pleased with the new building as Council is itself.

## Bradley Stoke Neighbourhood policing team

Bradley Stoke Neighbourhood policing team has continued its high visibility patrols in our "hot spots" with our community support officers Jason Green and Pat Gardener on foot patrol reassuring the local community and dealing with local neighbourhood issues.

Every Friday and Saturday evening the station provides a high visibility reassurance patrol around the sector dealing with any reported anti-social problems.

We have recently developed "Scene it", an interactive crime scene for young people which we launched at the Engage Festival which was a great success. This initiative can be used for any youth groups in the area.

The team is working in partnership with South Gloucestershire Council, Southern Brooks Community Partnership and the Town Council in establishing the Bradley Stoke Safer and Stronger Community Group which determines our beat priorities.

One community priority we are currently dealing with is school parking. We have set up a "3 strikes scheme" working with schools, parents and local residents to tackle parking issues at our seven local schools.

We now hold a monthly "Street Briefing" which is an informal meeting in a local road giving residents the opportunity to chat with the team. We hold them in the evening and notify the residents of our chosen street

beforehand by way of a leaflet drop. Notices are always posted on street lamps. This is an opportunity for residents to meet us in their street, just outside their front doors. As a result we have had useful information about all kinds of matters from parking and other situations with vehicles to problems we knew nothing about which are now being dealt with. Recent briefings were held in Oak Tree Crescent and Merryweather Close and we have further events planned at Huckley Way and Crystal Way. Another way we are meeting local residents is through our monthly "Have your Say" day. We attend busy locations across Bradley Stoke with crime reduction literature to listen to residents' problems and to prioritise the "real problems" affecting our residents. We have already been to the large Tesco store twice and to the Leisure Centre. Many people have now been able to discuss ongoing problems and, if advice is needed on any topic, we can assist straight away. We have had a really great response so far, so please look out for us.

Young people from the Jubilee Youth Club were involved in planning the event and with great gusto discussed where the lights went, designed the Dragons Den and climbed in the stream to heave rubbish out of it. They even got involved in coppicing hazel to provide frames for the art work. The highlight for them was using the 'walkie talkies', with which they really enjoyed talking to the lighting engineers and marshals during the event about things that needed to be done.

They learnt about team working, conservation and Diwali. A Hindu priest came to the youth club to discuss Diwali and a little bit about Hindi philosophy. The young people also tried a variety of Indian foods and sweets. In February there will be an opportunity to consider the Muslim religion as the youth work team aims to encourage young people to learn about their own cultures as well as other people's.

The new youth facility at Baileys Court Activity Centre will enable young people to engage in music projects, art work and discuss a variety of life issues such as bullying, relationships etc. Some of the young people were involved in raising money for the new equipment for the youth club and really enjoyed choosing the furniture etc. Bradley Stoke Town Council worked hard on developing this facility and are actively supporting the development of youth services for the young people of Bradley Stoke

Plans for the new facility include developing a music studio and a safe place for young people to discuss life issues with Rosemarie – a qualified nurse - such as new relationships.

# The Living Landmarks Project

The Living Landmarks Project has been working since August 2007. This exciting project which is funded for the year from August 2007 aims to bring together local children and young people and older residents as well as families and carers to explore what existed in the past through story telling, arts workshops and audio recordings. With the historic and anecdotal information we gather, we will work together with children and young people and older residents to exchange, design and create a total of 30 permanent visual and text plaques which will mark important places in the community.

Since the start in August, the project has achieved great success. The plaque proposals are well under way and we now wait in anticipation from the Highways department for approval. Once agreed, we will continue to work with schools and community groups to help and advice us about the creation of the plaques.

Schools are really committed to supporting the Landmarks work, and we now starting work in schools across Bradley Stoke and Patchway. Artists Colin Higginson, who is a visual artist currently artist in residence at Bristol Archives and Martin Maudsley, a story teller who has captivated children and young people with myths and fables, and Carrie Creamer will be working with school children in years 2,3 and 4. We look forward to sharing with you some of the stories, and images that we will collect on this journey of discovery.
